Committee Description/Purpose: To present horticultural information to the children of Mercer County within the guidelines of the RMG of MC programs and in partnership with other groups. Partnerships are key to CPC activities, and in them, the MG of MC works with: Public libraries in Mercer County, Public schools (i.e., 4 Trenton elementary schools, along with Mercer Elementary Schools (MES), Mercer County's special services school), Isles, Mercer County 4-H, the Trent House, HomeFront and Scout organizations.

Committee Goals for 2017:

- 1. To act as a resource for MGs and the community who work with children in school gardens.
- 2. To provide children's garden storybooks for Trenton schools
- 3. Provide contact hours for outreach events for Barbara Bromley's use in State reporting.

Accomplishments in 2017:

- 1. The Children's Program Committee (CPC) promoted our work in MGofMC newsletter articles.
- 2. The CPC held meetings on the 4rd Wednesday of the month, from 2-3pm at Extension Office.
- 3. CPC members led an Arbor Day program at an assisted senior living center with children from a neighboring school.
- 4. MGs worked with Special Needs children and teachers at the Mercer County Special Services Elementary School (MES).
- 5. MG CPC members planted bulbs at the Boys and Girls Club in Trenton.
- **6.** CPC scheduled visits to county libraries to participate in the Library Summer Reading program . In 2017, we changed the dates from July to May (to align with Arbor Day) to avoid a date conflict with the Trent House Program. Participation suffered with this change. In our summer reading program will revert to July in 2018.
- **7.** A significant area of accomplishment for the Children's Program Committee (CPC) is the ongoing activity with teachers and students in elementary schools in Mercer County.

Princeton, Hopewell, West Windsor, Pennington have at least one school where MG(s) volunteer (or work for pay) in these gardens.

Additionally MG CPC members partnered with Isles, Food Corps Volunteers Cat Lowther and Maddy

Tannous at five schools in Trenton and MC Special Services. There are 20 MGs working with children at these schools. In all over 250 contact hours during the Fall 2017 semester were recorded.
