

Gary Johnson is Professor Emeritus of Urban and Community Forestry with the University of Minnesota's Department of Forest Resources. His 45 years of academia includes the Universities of New Hampshire, Maryland, and for the past 31 years, Minnesota.

His particular areas of interest include Urban and community forestry, urban forest health, stress disorders (deicing salt damage), urbanized soils, diseases of trees and shrubs, risk assessment and management, tree preservation during construction activities, dysfunctional root systems (including stem girdling roots), and

His research and writings have largely focused on producing better root systems, minimizing construction damage to trees, preventing wind-loading damage to trees, and best planting practices. He was a consulting arborist and landscape manager for twenty years and a seasonal tree nursery worker for ten. Add up all of those years, and he is remarkably handsome for someone 140 years old.

Jenny Rose Carey is an avid hands-on gardener and professional horticulturist.



# Doug Tallamy



Douglas Tallamy is an American entomologist, ecologist and conservationist. He is a professor in the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware. He has written and co-authored several books, most notably *Bringing Nature Home*, *The Nature of Oaks*, and *Nature's Best Hope*, as well as many papers.

Tallamy advocates for home gardens and landscaping that bridge the gaps between parks and preserves in providing habitat for native species. He has spoken on the connections between plants and insects and how those relations are important to birds. Tallamy speaks nationwide about his concerns that the approach to gardening must change and has called for smaller lawns and the need to plant more native plants.

Tallamy has overseen rigorous field-studies that examine native versus introduced flora as caterpillar hosts and chickadee habitat.
